Remembrance at SVCS

A group of 12 students represented the school at the Remembrance Service on Angel Hill in Bury St Edmunds earlier this term. Nathaniel Van Der Hulks, Kimberley Cooper, and Elliot Fountain proudly placed the wreath at the memorial and were later presented with a certificate in recognition of their efforts.

The event brought together many schools, alongside the Mayor, veterans, and serving members of the armed forces. Our students conducted themselves exceptionally and were a credit to Stour Valley.

We also extend our thanks to the students who entered the artwork competition, which this year focused on the Royal Navy. Their impressive pieces were displayed in St Mary's Church throughout the week.



The whole school marked Remembrance with a two-minute silence, joined by armed forces personnel from Wattisham and Nigel Wolstenholme from the Royal British Legion. History visit to the Netherlands

As part of the History GCSE curriculum, which includes the Nazi occupation of the Netherlands, a group of Year 10 and Year 11 students, accompanied by Miss Howard, Mr Stephens, Miss Tompkins and Miss Terry, travelled via the Channel Tunnel to Amsterdam on Thursday 23rd October.

Students visited the Portuguese Synagogue and learned about the thousands of Jews who fled Spain and Portugal during the seventeenth century, establishing new and prosperous lives in Amsterdam during its 'Golden Age'.



A walking tour of the Old Jewish Quarter enabled students to identify 'stumbling stones' set into the pavements—memorial markers commemorating individuals taken from their homes during the Holocaust and murdered.

The Dutch Resistance Museum offered a highly interactive insight into life in the Netherlands before, during and after Nazi occupation. Students also took part in a workshop and enjoyed a guided tour of Anne Frank's House. The visit concluded with a trip to Camp Vught, an SS concentration camp and National Memorial, where excellent tour guides provided further historical context and deepened students' understanding of the Holocaust and its impact.

English & Drama Enrichment

On 14th November, Year 9 and Year 10 English and Drama students attended a Royal Shakespeare Company (RSC) production of King Lear at Ormiston Sudbury Academy.

This was a fantastic cultural opportunity and will greatly enrich their study of Shakespeare in the classroom.

We have become a RSC Associate school, which means we work in partnership with a Research School (we are working with Ormiston) to strengthen our use of high-quality, evidence-informed practice. This gives staff access to current research, high-quality CPD, implementation support, and professional networks, helping them make confident, effective decisions in the classroom. As a result, students benefit from consistently strong teaching, more effective interventions, and approaches proven to improve learning, behaviour and long-term outcomes.

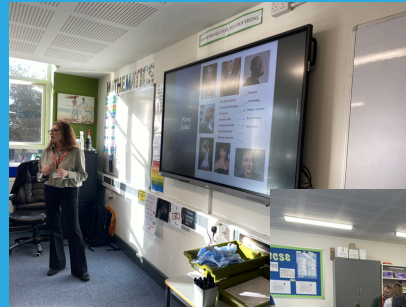

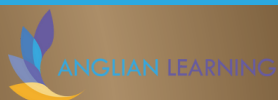

Update from Anglian Learning CEO

As CEO of Anglian Learning, the school Trust which supports your child/ren's school, I would like to share some key highlights of the work we have undertaken in the last few months. These activities have benefitted the pupils, workforce and communities of our Trust.

Firstly, I was delighted to attend our Platform 25 exhibition in Cambridge which brings together artwork from each of our secondary schools. As usual, the quality on display was impressive and many congratulations to all pupils whose work was exhibited. My thanks also to the art teachers across our Trust for their support of the exhibition, which was open to members of the public.

We also launched Anglian Learning's long-term strategy, which has three main areas of focus: Belonging by Design, Great Schools and Connected Communities. Next term, I will share with you more information about this strategy. The school's vision and values align well with Anglian Learning's, making them a perfect fit for our community. We look forward to learning from each other and inviting their pupils to take part in our Trust-wide events in the coming months and years.
